



### Adverbs of frequency

We use adverbs of frequency to answer the question *How often...?*

Adverbs of frequency go before all verbs (except *be*) and after *be*.

*I **always** have toast for breakfast.*

*Do you **usually** go to work by bus?*

*She doesn't **often** go to bed late.*

*They're **sometimes** late.*

*She **hardly ever** watches TV.*

*He is **never** stressed.*

### Other ways to talk about frequency:

*Once/ Twice/ Three times a day/ week/ month/ year*

*Every day/ week/ month/ year*

### Prepositions of time

- **In** for parts of the day, months, seasons and years.

*In the morning*

*In the afternoon*

*In the evening*

*In December*

*In the summer*

*In 1998*

- **On** for days and dates.

*On Monday (morning)*

*On the 12<sup>th</sup> of July*

*On my birthday*

- **At** for times of the day, night, the weekend and festivals.

*At three o'clock.*

*At midday/midnight*

*At lunchtime*

*At night*

*At the weekend*

*At Christmas/Easter/New Year*
